EDITOR'S NOTE. What follows is a new edition. The transcription on which the Paine edition of 1901 was based has been compared with the original manuscript diaries. All omitted passages have been restored to the text. Spelling and punctuation have been restored to match Baldwin's actual practice. Standardized dates, in the mm/dd/yy form, have been provided for each datable entry in the diary. These dates are also in italics. Baldwin's original dating, which varied considerably from month to month in form and completeness, is also preserved as part of the text. Individuals named by Baldwin are identified alphabetically in biographical notes in the section titled Individuals Named in the Baldwin Diary, 253–87. These entries include the dates on which a person is mentioned by Baldwin. Footnotes in the diary text indicate a name that cannot be further identified, a historical or public figure that CCB was not likely to encounter personally, or explanatory comments on a particular entry.

DIARY OF CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS BALDWIN

1829-1835

The diary for 1829 consists of two separate interleaved almanacs for that year, one with regular and extensive entries (1829 Diary 1) and one with scattered entries (1829 Diary 2). A few of the Diary 2 entries duplicate those in Diary 1, or briefly record events that are described in more detail in Diary 1. However, most of the Diary 2 entries refer to Baldwin's personal finances: promissory notes and payments to creditors which are not mentioned in Diary 1. Entries from 1829 Diary 2 follow entries of the same date in Diary 1, but are enclosed in brackets.

Clarence Brigham (AAS librarian, 1908–30, and director, 1930–59) made a handwritten note in pencil on the page after the flyleaf of 1829 Diary 2. "C.C. Baldwin's Diary. Not as full as his regular diary, which is now printed."

JANUARY, 1829.

1/1/29 1. There has been no snow yet, and but very little rain during the whole of the last month. The ground is frozen, tho not deep. The roads are perfectly smoothe, and the weather during the last 30 days has been unusually mild and pleasant: much of the time the earth could be ploughed and all the old people say that they rarely have seen such a December. To-day cloudy and appears like snow: cold. Spy, Aegis and Yeoman addresses for the new year are recd and paid for. 1 Snow falls about an inch in the afternoon and evening: Visit the Burbank School, to ascertain whether the master does his duty, he having been complained of: complaint not without foundation: Reprove the Master & give advice to the scholars: Visit the New Worcester school: divide it, giving part to the Master and part to Mistress, being over 100 pupils in the District:2 Ride T. Kinnicutt's horse: rains in the ev'g: Visit John Davis and see for 1st time Miss Mary H. Estabrook of Royalston, intended wife of Isaac Davis, Esq: think well of her:

- Massachusetts Spy; National Aegis & General Advertiser; Massachusetts Yeoman, and Worcester Saturday Journal and Advertiser. Worcester weekly newspapers to which Baldwin (hereafter CCB) subscribed.
- 2. CCB took his School Committee duties seriously. A former teacher, he felt abundantly qualified to correct and criticize the town's teachers.

1/2/29 2. Cold, cloudy: afternoon snows fast: Subscribe for American Jurist, \$5, Editors, Richard Fletcher, Willard Phillips, Sam¹ Sewall, John B. Davis of Boston: pay C. Harris \$25 for books &c:

1/3/29 3. Very cold: at sunrise 10° below zero: clear: get \$350: insured on my books at the Franklin Ins. Office. It all cost \$3.45. Insurance begins at noon: Attend Justice Court, enter 16 actions before C. Allen.

1/4/29 4. Sunday. Not so cold: cloudy: thermometer at sunrise 5° below 0. New Year sermon by Mr. Hill. 55 died: 11 in our Parish:-10 females and one male:

1/5/29 5. Cold: clear: more moderate than yesterday: appearance of snow: Attended Justice Court before Isaac Goodwin, Esq. Lowell Factory burnt: loss \$120,000: Receive a letter from Hon. John Davis from Washington.

1/6/29 6. Warm: cloudy: thaws: Have sick-head-ache: go to bed:

1/7/29 7. Very warm and pleasant all day, thaws much and all the snow disappears. Appears like rain. Get well of headache.

1/8/29 8. During the night it rained, and froze as it fell, and the ice gathered on the branches of the trees more heavily than it was ever known to before: The shade trees in the street are greatly injured: many of them crushed to the earth. Cloudy and cold, with wind which injures the trees: Dine with Dr. Blood.

1/9/29 9. Clear and very cold. The ice on the trees gives everything the appearance of enchantment: Many families ride out in their sleighs to enjoy the sight. The ice makes good sleighing.


1/10/29 10. Continues very cold and clear, does not thaw: wind: and great damage to the trees, which are surpassingly beautiful: very cold.

1/11/29 11. Clear: cold: does not thaw: The trees and grass invite the people to ride out to enjoy the sight, which is wonderful.

1/12/29 12. Clear: cold: does not thaw: Go to Boston: Charles Paine keeps my office: Put up at Earle's: Go to the old theatre.³

1/13/29 13. Rather cloudy: warmer: looks like rain: Go to the Court House at Lechmere Point to look after the history of the name of Baldwin, do not find much: Go to the new theatre: Josiah Quincy is proposed for President of Harvard College by the corporation:

1/14/29 14. Warm and foggy: Look and laugh at many very ridiculous things, viz.: a ram with 4 horns: an ox weighing 4000



CCB notes that he does business with stationer Clarendon Harris. The enterprises of Harris's Main Street, Worcester, bookstore included stationery and blank books, several publications, and a lending library. Among the titles available to subscribers were several that Baldwin mentions reading, including Vidocq and Ouvaroff. A Catalogue of Clarendon Harris's Circulating Library at the Worcester Book-Store (Worcester, 1835).

- 3. Earle's was a Boston tavern, or hotel, with beds and meals for travelers. The "old theatre" Federal Street Theatre—was Boston's first. Opened in 1794, it was designed by the young American architect Charles Bulfinch with about a thousand seats.
- 4. The "new theatre"—Tremont Street Theatre—opened in 1827. Financed by a group of wealthy Bostonians, it was designed by Isaiah Rogers in the Greek Revival style.



CCB boarded at James Worthington's Worcester Hotel from October 1827 until April 1834, except for a summer when he lived at Governor John Davis's with William Lincoln and John Lincoln. From 1823 until moving to the hotel, he had boarded with Eliza Blake, a widow who supplemented her income by taking in boarders. On April 1, 1834, he moved to the Worcester Coffee House, which was near the Court House and the American Antiquarian Society. Receipt of the Worcester Hotel.

1/21/29 21. Cloudy and appearance of snow: Sick with a cold: Study Law all day: In the evening visited by Joshua Coffin of Newbury, a queer genius and an antiquary: lend him a Dollar, which he says will defray his expenses to Concord, N. H., & thence to Newbury via Providence, R. I.!!!

1/22/29 22. Twelve manufactories of wool & cotton have been burnt in N. E. within the last 20 days!

1/23/29 23. Clear & cold: No sleighing: A little snow: Visit the apprentices school.⁷

1/24/29 24. Study Law: Cold, clear, looks like snow:

1/25/29 25. Mr. Noyes of Brookfield preaches:

1/26/29 26. Pleasant and warm, thaws: Eliza. Blake returns from Keene with G. T. Rice.

1/27/29 27. Cloudy and warm: Study Law:

1/28/29 28. Read life of Sir Josh: Reynolds by Northcote

1/29/29 29. Have rheumatism in my wrist very bad. Study law and write to Mr. Davis in W. [Hon. Timothy Pickering dies: 84. 1829 Diary 2]

1/30/29 30. Study law. Examined school. It snowed on Tuesday night & since has been good sleighing: Cold & clear: 1/31/29 31. Cold. Study N. T. [New Testament] & Law: I have boarded at Worcester Hotel since 20 Oct., 1827. From 19 June 1823 to 20 Oct. 1827, I boarded with Mrs. Eliza A. Blake, widow of the late Hon. Francis Blake:

2/1/29 1. Cold, clear: Mr. Hill preaches & Dr. Bancroft After meeting ride to Holden in sleigh with Gardiner Paine: fine sleighing: Study N. T.

2/5/29 5. Cold night: Study Law: Examine school:

2/6/29 6. Pleasant: Perfect sleighing: Ride to Wesson's in Westboro with Eliz^a. Green, C. Harris et ux. T. Kinnicutt, Esq. et ux: Ste. Salisbury, Esq. et Sa Bigelow accompany us: Very fine time of it:

2/7/29 7. Warm, thaws: Enter seventeen justice actions: Study Law: Read N.T:

2/8/29 8. Cloudy, warm: Rev. George Allen preaches for Mr. Hill for first time: he is orthodox: much talk about it: the more rigid are worried about it. Study N.T. It rains all night and snow disappears:

2/9/29 9. Examine school: Study Law and N.T: Visited by Rev. Mr. Hill officially:

2/10/29 10. Warm for season: Study Law & N.T. in Greek. Witness Lucy Patch's will: snows in evening: Read President Adams' letter to H. G. Otis & others:

2/11/29 11. Cloudy and warm: Snows in the evening but not so as to make sleighing: Study Law in A. M. et P. M. N.T. in Greek. Visit Doctor Blood in evening: meet Misses L. & S. Bancroft: play vingtun.⁹

2/12/29 12. Study N.T. and Law: Receive an invitation to a party at Gen¹ Heard's for Friday evening: accept it.

2/13/29 13. Cold, pleasant, no sleighing: Study Law and N.T: in Greek: Read Clarkson's life of William Penn: Receive a letter from my friend Jos. Willard of Lancaster:


2/14/29 14. Have a new blue coat of Kimberly \$20.50, to be paid for first of June: wear every day:

2/15/29 15. Cold: Attend meeting: Hear Mr. Hill. Invite Is. Davis to dine with me: Read in N.T.

2/16/29 16. Last day of service for March Court: make no writs: Read Law and N.T. in Greek:

2/17/29 17. Cold and pleasant: no sleighing: Examine the White school: Horseback: Make a specification of Thomas

- 8. CCB attended Worcester's Second Church, which was Unitarian and served by the Reverend Alonzo Hill as junior pastor. The Reverend George Allen was a Trinitarian or 'orthodox' Congregationalist minister in Shrewsbury. Most Unitarian and Trinitarian clergy did not exchange pulpits.
- Vingtun: the still widely played card game, Twenty-One.
