Finely printed in an edition limited to 271 copies of which this is one of 250 copies printed on specially made paper by Batchelor & Sons (Bibliography no.XXXVIII; Franklin pp.186-197,242). An especially fine copy with only minor rubbing to the publisher's slipcase (note: the *Bibliography* does not mention the slipcase). Entirely bright and clean, inside and out. All four ties present in the original condition.

There were a further 21 copies printed on vellum. Printed in Subiaco type. This was one of the last items to be issued by the press, and the last to bear the hand colored initials of Graily Hewitt and his assistants Ida D. Henstock and Helen E. Hinckley. These initials appear throughout in green and blue and are an attractive compliment to the text which is printed in red

and black throughout. Two colors of hand colored initials were only used on one other occasion by the press in 1902 for Dante's *Inferno*. The work is often called the most beautiful of all the Ashendenes. The bookseller James Bain found this book "one of the most beautiful books that has ever come from the Ashendene Press; it is quite perfect in every way" (Franklin p.195). St. John Hornby wrote

in the Bibliography that "The print-

ing of this book was due to the fact that my friend and partner, A.D. Power, had with the help of one or two Hebrew scholars compiled from the various versions of 'Ecclesiasticus' a text which he subsequently caused to be written out on vellum and illuminated by A.J. Fairbank and Louise Powell respectively in a volume of great beauty. One day he happened to tell me that he thought of having the version printed, as many of his friends wished to possess it. The temptation to add yet one more book to my list was too strong for me to resist and I there and then offered to print a small edition. I have never regretted having done so, as in my humble judgment it is one of the most satisfactory of the books of the Press."

Founded by Charles Harry St. John Hornby (1867-1946), the Ashendene Press issued 40 books, plus additional minor pieces, from 1895-1935. Less elaborate in appearance and design than William Morris' Kelmscott volumes, but more ornamental than the products of Cobden-Sanderson's Doves press, the Ashendene volumes have long been considered the most satisfying of English private press books. This archive consists of seven (7) pieces that relate or were designed by the famed graphic artist and author, Ladislav Sutnar. Most in pristine condition, with only a few signs of very minor wear. Very rare.

Items in the archive include: Adventures with a Logotype (1959), "the quest for symbols" (1959), How to Show Telephone Numbers on Letterheads (Circa 1960), reprint of the article New Graphic Design Jazzes Up Ads (originally written in Business Week, August 12, 1961), and Modern Design in Advertising (n.d., but circa 1963, Robert Altshuler and Ralph Gates, New York).

Also included is a narrow 8vo paper wrapper piece by Robert W. Sarnoff titled Business and Society (1971).

Finally, and the most valuable piece of the archive, is the first edition of *Visual Design in Action - Principles*, *Purposes* with the accompaning narrow stiff-paper wrappers catalogue of the exhibition held in 1961 hosted by The Contemporary Arts Center and Champion Papers Inc. (Hastings House, 1961, New York, some foxing to the cloth boards, else fine in a near fine dust jacket).

Ladislav Sutnar has won acclaim both in Europe and the United States. He was the Chief designer for Czechoslovakia at the 1939 World's Fair and had his own firm in New York City. He was the winner of innumerable design awards during the early part of the 20th century, as well as being a successful author on type and graphic design. Although he is uncredited, his contributions to business organization benefited society, which included creating a user-friendly telephone directory by implementing parenthetical area codes. 


Designed, printed by letterpress and illustrated by Gaylord Schanilec. The text reproduces stories obtained from the ST. PAUL DAILY GLOBE and the ST. PAUL PIONEER PRESS during the period 1887 to 1889 when a local bridge was under construction. However the most impressive feature of this book is the illustrations. They are printed by letterpress in five to seven


colors using three to five different blocks and helped launch Schanilec's career as a high-quality printer. The results are breathtaking. A very impressive start from this relatively unknown private press, and a must for all collectors of fine contemporary private press work.

Bound in gray cloth by Campbell-Logan Bindery. The text is Plantin Monotype and was initially set at the Out-of-Sorts Letter Foundry, the titles are set in Onix, and the whole was printed by Gaylord Schanilec at the Minnesota Center for the Book Arts on Basingwerk Heavyweight paper. 





The vellum spine and custom clamshell box were created by the master bookbinder Jamie Kamph of Stonehouse Bindery.

R.T. Nichol has provided the first English translation of this text from the Latin edition of 1535. Printed on Kelmscott hand-made paper, designed by Bruce Rogers and printed at

the press of Emery Walker and Wilfred Merton. This is the first book Rogers printed on English soil, and is, justifiably, a BR30 title. A magnificent book.




The typography is by the notable American book designer Bruce Rogers (1870-1957), who "was appreciated in his lifetime. In addition to several honorary degrees, in 1948 he was awarded a gold medal from the American Academy of Arts and Letters for

distinction in the graphic arts. Over decades of accomplishment in which he designed approximately 500 books... Rogers literally defined the profession of book designing in the United States" (ANB). the American Revolution in 1783 to the Louisiana Purchase in 1803. The one hundred entries were selected on the basis of their historical importance, their impact at the time of publication, their representative nature in the spectrum of writings about the period, and their interest to collectors. Each entry provides commentary on the main entry and discusses related books and materials. Items include treaties, political pamphlets, official acts and laws, printed speeches, prints, atlases, broadsides, proclamations, military manuals, constitutional material, personal narratives, histories, debates, travel narratives, personal memoirs, and biographies.

The work draws on some forty-five years' experience in the antiquarian book trade. Hopefully it will prove useful to collectors, booksellers, and institutions with collections concerned with the Federal Era. [Book # 140899]

Brinkley (1841 - 1912) was an Anglo-Irish newspaper owner, editor and scholar who resided in Meiji period Japan for over 40 years, where he was the author of numerous books on Japanese culture, art and architecture and an English-Japanese Dictionary. He was an officer attached to the British Legation ca 1867-1871, then an advisor to the Meiji Government and an instructor at the Naval Gunnery School. He owned and edited The Japan Mail From 1881, which later merged with The Japan Times, and was foreign correspondent of The Times Of London. [Book # 140858]

Handwritten corrections, thought to be in Gilbert's own hand, on pp. 11, 22, and 47, but not on 14 or 63 as in some other copies. Minor soiling to covers and minor wear to leather spine labels. Two ex-libris bookplates, one of "Liechtensteinanis" and a more recent bookplate of "Cornelius Hauck Collection, Cincinnati, OH" on front pastedown. Errata slip bound in correcting the error on the spine indicating the date is "1550" when it is in fact "1600". Occasional foxing throughout the text. Previously featured at an auction at Christies in 2006. A lovely copy in a very nice contemporary clamshell box.



It cost the author 18 years of investigation and experiment. Large marginal asterisks mark what he considered great discoveries, and small asterisks minor ones. There are 21 of the former and 178 of the later. Gilbert shows that a freely suspended magnet is controlled by the earth and not, as supposed, by extra-terrestrial influences. his magnetic theory enabled him to explain the behavior of the compass-needle, the dip-needle, the magnetic condition of vertical masses of iron, and the magnetic properties of heated iron bars when allowed to cool while lying in the magnetic meridian. Gilbert is chary of prose and wrathful in denunciation; he was a staunch Coperican, and warm friend of Kepler and Galileo." [Wheeler Gift.] ". It is



with Gilbert, who was physician to Queen Elizabeth I, that the modern development of electricity and magnetism really starts. His book On the Magnet was the first major English scientific treatise based on experimental methods of research. He coined the terms "electricity," "electric force," and "electric attraction". He contended that the earth was one great magnet; he distinguished magnetic mass



from weight; and he worked on the application of terrestrial magnetism to navigation." [Printing and the Mind of Man] . 



Leibniz's paper famously preceded Newton's publication of his own discovery of calculus, and the question of whether Leibniz plagiarized Newton's unpublished work caused a lengthy furore in the scientific world; it is now recognized that both men discovered calculus independently. "The infinitesimal calculus originated in the seventeenth century with the researches of Kepler, Cavalieri, Torricelli, Fermat and Barrow, but the two independent inventors of the subject, as we understand it today, were Newton and Leibniz. The subsequent controversy in the early part of the eighteenth century as to the priority of their discoveries - one of the most notorious disputes in the history of science - led to an unfortunate divorce of English from Continental mathematics that lasted until the end of the first quarter of the nineteenth century. Although both Newton and Leibniz developed similar ideas, Leibniz devised a superior symbolism and his notation is now an essential feature in all presentations of the subject" (PMM).



The paper, just seven pages long, "was the first attempt to set out the rules governing infinitesimal procedures. The rules are introduced geometrically, translated into algebraic terms, and then redescribed in terms of differentials. This enables Leibniz to provide basic rules of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. Specifying rules for the manipulation of signs, depending on whether the ordinates increase or decrease, he moves to the behaviour of curves, leading him to introduce second-order differentials, and by these means he offers procedures for finding powers and taking roots... Nevertheless, it should be said that the programme advocated in *Nova methodus* was obscurely formulated, and the paper was so cautious in its presentation that it hardly mentioned infinitesimals at all. The programme was quickly developed by the Bernoullis and others, however, and the first textbook, Guillaume de l'HĀ´pital's *Analyse des infiniment petits* (1696), written under the guidance of Johann Bernoulli, is far more explicit" (Clarke & Wilson, p. 349). servation of energy' (Norman Catalogue). This work was 'an outcome of [Helmholtz's] interest in the problem of perpetual motion. Leaning heavily on the value of experience in the formulation of ideas, he con-

cluded that perpetual motion was impossible without the continued replenishment of energy from some source. Analyzing different forms of energy and different types of force and motion, Helmholtz grouped them into two categories - active (kinetic) and tension or dead (potential) forces. He gave the mathematical expression to the energy of motion as being the product of half the mass times the square of the velocity of motion. This provided an experimental measure in research of all forces including muscular and chemical' (Dibner).

Helmholtz 'was able to derive a general equation that expressed the kinetic energy of a moving body... This equation could be applied in many fields to show that energy is always conserved and it led to the first law of thermodynamics, which states that the total energy of a system and its surroundings remains constant even if it may be changed from one form of energy to another' (Hutchinson's Dictionary of scientific biography p318).

This classic paper was presented of the Physikalische Gesellschaft of Berlin on July 23, 1847, and submitted to Poggendorff for publication in the Annalen but was turned down by him. Helmholtz then had it printed privately.
